BRONCOS KICK OFF 50TH SEASON WITH PRESEASON OPENER IN SAN FRANCISCO



One of eight American Football League charter franchises celebrating their 50th year, the Denver Broncos begin their 2009 season on Friday night when they visit the San

Francisco 49ers. Kickoff is set for 7 p.m. PDT, and the game will be broadcast locally on KCNC-TV (CBS 4) and KOA Radio (850 AM).

QUICKLY:

* - **Josh McDaniels** was named the 12th head coach in Broncos history on Jan. 12 after spending the previous eight seasons with New England. He was part of three Super Bowl wins with the Patriots, who led the NFL in points (1,384 / 28.8 ppg.) during his three years as offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach from 2006-08.

* - The Broncos' roster features 42 players acquired in the offseason (22 rookies, 19 free agents, 1 trade—51.2 percent of their entire roster).

* - Since their first year in 1960, the Broncos have posted the seventh-most wins in football with 403 victories that rank second among original AFL teams.

OFFENSE:

* - **QB Kyle Orton**, acquired by the Broncos in an offseason trade from Chicago, is 21-12 (.636) as a starter for his career. He owns the NFL's best home record (15-2 / .882) as a starter since entering the league in 2005.

* - The Broncos' offensive line features two players who earned All-Pro recognition in their first year as a starter in 2008 (**LT Ryan Clady**, Associated Press / **RT Ryan Harris**, *Sports Illustrated*) along with one Pro Bowl selection (**C Casey Wiegmann**).

DEFENSE:

* - **Defensive Coordinator Mike Nolan** served as San Francisco's head coach during the last four years. In his 11 seasons as an NFL defensive coordinator, his defenses have averaged 32.3 takeaways a year and had seven top-10 NFL turnover rankings.

* - **CB Champ Bailey** is one Pro Bowl selection away from tying Pro Football Hall of Famer Mike Haynes for the most Pro Bowls (9) at cornerback in NFL history.

SPECIAL TEAMS:

* - In his seven seasons as an NFL special teams coach, **Special Teams Coordinator Mike Priefer** has worked with units that have accounted for 14 blocked kicks and seven return touchdowns.

* - **K Matt Prater** last year tied a Broncos single-season record with five 50-yard field goals and ranked fifth in the league with 19 touchbacks on kickoffs.

BRONCOS AT 49ERS — POINTS OF INTEREST

The Broncos are one of eight original American Football League teams celebrating their 50th season in 2009... Denver's 403 overall wins are second among all original AFL teams and rank seventh among all clubs since 1960... **Josh McDaniels** was named the 12th head coach in Broncos history on Jan. 12 after spending the last eight years with New England, including the previous three seasons as its offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach... He was part of a Patriots franchise that won three Super Bowls, four AFC championships and six division titles while posting the NFL's best overall record (111-34 / .766) from 2001-08... Hired by Denver at 32 years, eight months old, **McDaniels** is the sixth-youngest head coach in NFL history at the time of his hire... He is one of seven rookie head coaches in the NFL in 2009—Last year, three rookie head coaches led their clubs to the postseason... The Broncos are holding training camp at their facility (Paul D. Bowlen Memorial Broncos Centre) for the seventh year in a row—Rookies and quarterbacks reported on July 27 and veterans reported on July 30... Denver will open its preseason on the road for the 12th consecutive year, extending its club record, and has played 17 of its last 19 preseason openers away from home since 1990... The Broncos are 24-25 all-time in preseason openers and own a 12-2 record in their last 14 openers... The 49ers are the Broncos' most common preseason opponent (32 meetings) with Denver posting an 18-14 record in those games (8-7 on the road)—The two clubs last met in the preseason in the 2007 opener (17-13 Broncos win)... Denver has posted at least a .500 record in the preseason in 13 of the last 14 seasons and is 11-5 (.688) in the preseason since 2005 (2-2 last two years)... The Broncos selected 10 players in the 2009 NFL Draft and had two first-round selections (Georgia **RB Knowshon Moreno**-No. 12 and Tennessee **OLB/DE Robert Ayers**-No. 18) for the first time in club history... Denver has 12 rookie college free agents competing in its training camp—the Broncos had three CFAs make their active roster out of training camp last year (**P Brett Kern**, **T Tyler Polunbus** and **ILB Wesley Woodyard**) and have had a college free agent make the opening day roster in each of the last five years... The Broncos' 2009 roster features 42 new players (22 rookies, 19 free agents, 1 trade) with that total accounting for 51.2 percent (42-of-82) of their current roster... **Brian Xanders**, who this offseason became the youngest general manager in the NFL (38), led the Broncos' personnel department in the acquisition of several key players in the offseason, including **QB Kyle Orton** (Trade-Chicago), **S Brian Dawkins** (UFA-Philadelphia), **DL Ronald Fields** (UFA-San Francisco), **CB André Goodman** (UFA-Miami) and **S Renaldo Hill** (UFA-Miami)... **Dawkins** owns the fourth-most Pro Bowls (7) at safety in NFL history and joins **CB Champ Bailey** in Denver's secondary—**Bailey** is tied for the second-most Pro Bowls (8) at cornerback in league annals... **Orton** is 21-12 (.636) for his career as a starting QB and owns the NFL's best home record (15-2 / .882) as a starter since entering the league in 2005... The Broncos' offensive line in 2008 tied for the NFL lead in fewest sacks allowed with a franchise-record 12... **LT Ryan Clady** (Associated Press) and **RT Ryan Harris** (*Sports Illustrated*) received All-Pro recognition in their first year as starters and veteran **C Casey Wiegmann** earned his first career Pro Bowl selection in 2008... During the last two years, **WR Brandon Marshall** ranks second in the NFL in receptions (206) and is the only player in the league to post consecutive 100-catch, 1,200-yard seasons... **Marshall** was a Pro Bowl starter in 2008... **WR Eddie Royal** in 2008 totaled the second-most receptions (91) by a rookie in NFL history... **Mike Nolan** was hired by Denver as its defensive coordinator in the offseason after spending the last four years as San Francisco's head coach... In his 11 years as an NFL defensive coordinator, **Nolan's** defenses have averaged 32.3 takeaways a season and posted seven top-10 NFL rankings in turnovers, including in each of his last five years as a DC... **LB D.J. Williams** ranks second in the NFL in tackles per game (8.7) in the last two years according to press box statistics... Denver **Special Teams Coordinator Mike Priefer** has coached units in the NFL that have totaled 14 blocked kicks and seven return touchdowns in seven seasons as a special teams coach... **K Matt Prater** tied a Broncos single-year record with five 50-yard field goals in 2008... **P Brett Kern** was a consensus All-Rookie pick last season and was fifth in the league in gross punting average (46.7 yds.).

BRONCOS CELEBRATE 50TH SEASON IN 2009

One of eight American Football League charter franchises, the Denver Broncos are celebrating their 50th season of professional football in 2009. As part of the celebration, the Broncos will wear their original 1960 uniforms against New England on Oct. 11 and at San Diego on Oct. 19.

The Broncos also are set to practice twice at INVESCO Field at Mile High during training camp. The club hosted an evening practice open to the public on Thursday, Aug. 6, that was attended by 13,402 fans (largest attendance ever at a Broncos practice) and also will hold a practice at the stadium on Monday, Aug. 10 (media only).

BRONCOS OPEN PRESEASON ON THE ROAD FOR THE 12TH CONSECUTIVE YEAR

Friday's game in San Francisco marks the 12th consecutive season that Denver will open its preseason away from home. That streak is the longest in club history with the previous longest occurring from 1992-96 when the Broncos played five preseason openers in a row away from home.

During the last 11 years to begin the preseason, Denver has played nine road games in addition to competing in the 1999 American Bowl in Sydney, Australia, and the 2004 Hall of Fame Game in Canton, Ohio.

Denver's last home preseason opener was in 1997 when it defeated Buffalo 31-10 at Mile High Stadium.

The Broncos have played 17 of 19 preseason openers away from home since 1990.

BRONCOS PRESEASON OPENER HISTORY

The Broncos own a 24-25 all-time record in preseason openers, including a 12-9 mark in away games. Denver also is 9-9 at home and 3-7 at neutral sites in preseason openers.

The Broncos have won 12 of their last 14 preseason openers.

2009 NFL DRAFT RECAP

For the first time in club history, the Broncos selected two players in the opening round of the NFL draft when they picked Georgia running back Knowshon Moreno (12th) and Tennessee outside linebacker/defensive end Robert Ayers (18th) in April.

Below is a look at Denver's 10 selections in the 2009 NFL Draft:

RB Knowshon Moreno (Rd. 1-12, Georgia) - Totaled the sixth-most rushing yards in the nation and the most rushing yards in the SEC (2,734) during his two seasons at Georgia, earning two first-team all-conference honors.

OLB/DE Robert Ayers (Rd. 1-18, Tennessee) - Ranked third in the SEC with a team-high 27.5 tackles for a loss during his final two years at Tennessee.

CB Alphonso Smith (Rd. 2-37, Wake Forest) - Totaled the 10th most career interceptions (21) in NCAA history (all levels) and twice earned first-team All-ACC honors at Wake Forest.

S Darcel McBath (Rd. 2-48, Texas Tech) - Started every game during his last three years at Texas Tech, earning All-Big 12 recognition during each of those seasons.

TE Richard Quinn (Rd. 2-64, North Carolina) - Established himself as one of the best blocking tight ends in the country at North Carolina, where he picked up honorable mention All-America honors from Scout.com in his final season.

S David Bruton (Rd. 4-114, Notre Dame) - Appeared in 596 special teams plays for his career at Notre Dame and led the Fighting Irish with 182 tackles and seven interceptions in his final two years.

G Seth Olsen (Rd. 4-132, Iowa) - Earned first-team All-Big Ten honors and several All-America accolades as a senior at Iowa, blocking for Doak Walker Award winner (nation's best RB) Shonn Greene.

WR Kenny McKinley (Rd. 5-141, South Carolina) - Set South Carolina career records for receptions (207) and receiving yards (2,781) while ranking third and 11th, respectively, in SEC annals for those categories.

QB Tom Brandstater (Rd. 6-174, Fresno State) - Totaled the fifth-most career passing yards (6,857) in Fresno State history as a three-time first-team Academic All-WAC pick.

C Blake Schlueter (Rd. 7-225, Texas Christian) - Named first-team All-MWC as a senior for a TCU team that posted its highest final national ranking (No. 7) since 1959.

* - **QB Kyle Orton**, acquired by the Broncos in a trade from Chicago on April 2, owns a 21-12 (.636) record as a starting quarterback during his four NFL seasons with Chicago.

* - **QB Chris Simms**, who signed with Denver as an unrestricted free agent on March 5, led Tampa Bay to an NFC South title as a 10-game starter in 2005 and is fully recovered from the spleen injury that limited his playing time during the last three years.

* - Denver's offensive line in 2008 featured two players who earned All-Pro recognition (**LT Ryan Clady** and **RT Ryan Harris**) along with one Pro Bowl selection (**C Casey Wiegmann**). The Broncos tied for first in the league and set a club record with 12 sacks allowed.

* - **C Casey Wiegmann** has taken every possible regular season and postseason snap since 2001 (8,046) for the longest streak by an NFL offensive lineman.

* - **T Ryan Clady** was the only 16-game starting tackle in the NFL as a rookie last year to not allow a full sack (0.5) according to Stats Inc., and he finished third in AP Offensive Rookie of the Year voting.

* - **G Chris Kuper** was the only 16-game starting guard in the NFL last year to not allow a sack (0.0) according to Stats Inc.

* - **WR Eddie Royal** led all NFL rookies in receptions (91), receiving yards (980), receiving touchdowns (5) and combined yards (1,829) as a rookie in 2008. His 91 receptions were the second most by a rookie in NFL history.

* - **WR Brandon Marshall** in 2008 posted his second consecutive 100-catch, 1,200-yard receiving season (104-1,265) and was named a Pro Bowl starter. During the last two years, he ranks second in the NFL in receptions (206) and third in receiving yards (2,590).

* - **TE Daniel Graham**, who has served as a captain for the Broncos and is regarded as one of the league's best blocking tight ends, was in New England with Head Coach Josh McDaniels from 2002-06.

* - **TE Tony Scheffler** led all NFL tight ends in yards per reception last year, averaging a club-record (TEs) 16.1 yards (40-645). Since entering the league in 2006, he leads all league tight ends in yards per reception (13.8).

* - **RB Knowshon Moreno**, who was selected by Denver with the 12th overall pick, led the SEC and ranked sixth in the nation in rushing yards (2,734) during his two seasons playing for Georgia.

* - Other key offseason additions to the Broncos' offense include **RB Correll Buckhalter** (UFA-Phi.), **WR Jabar Gaffney** (UFA-N.E.), **RB LaMont Jordan** (UFA-N.E.), **WR Brandon Lloyd** (FA-Chi.) and **TE Richard Quinn** (D2-64, North Carolina).

ORTON BEGINS FIRST SEASON IN DENVER

Kyle Orton, who joined the Broncos on April 2 in a trade from Chicago, compiled a 21-12 (.636) record as a starter during his first four NFL seasons with the Bears from 2005-08. He guided the Bears to a winning season in each of his two years as a full-time starter, including the 2005 campaign when he registered a 10-5 record in 15 starts for a Chicago team that won the NFC North title. Last year, Orton was 9-6 in his 15 starts with the Bears.

Orton has a 15-2 record for his career as a starter at home for an .882 winning percentage that is the best in the NFL during that time.

SIMMS BEGINS FIRST YEAR IN DENVER

Quarterback Chris Simms, who led the Buccaneers to an NFC South title in 2005, begins his first season in Denver after he was signed by the team as an unrestricted free agent on March 5.

The son of former Giants quarterback (1979-93) and current CBS lead commentator Phil Simms, Chris and his father make up one of six father-son quarterback combinations to play in the NFL.

Simms, who is fully recovered from the spleen injury that he suffered early in 2006 that limited him during the last three years, has played 20 games (15 starts) for his NFL career (regular season) and is 7-8 as a starter. He has completed 292-of-494 (59.1%) career passes for 3,094 yards with 12 touchdowns and 17 interceptions.

The Broncos return all five starters along their offensive line who last season helped the team tie for the NFL-low in sacks allowed with a franchise-record 12. Denver also posted the lowest sack percentage per pass play (1.9 / 12-632) in club annals as well as in the league for the year.

Several members of the unit earned individual awards last season. Veteran center Casey Wiegmann was named to his first Pro Bowl while rookie left tackle Ryan Clady was a second-team All-Pro (Associated Press) and finished third in AP Offensive Rookie of the Year voting. First-year starter Ryan Harris was named to *Sports Illustrated's* All-Pro team (Peter King) for his work at right tackle.

Veteran left guard Ben Hamilton and right guard Chris Kuper, who was the only 16-game starting guard to not allow a sack (0.0) in 2008 according to Stats Inc., also enjoyed strong seasons. All five members were a key reason why Denver ranked second in the NFL in yards per game (395.8) and third in yards per rush (4.8) despite placing a league-high seven running backs on injured reserve.

His defenses consistently have ranked among the league's best at forcing turnovers with an average of 32.3 takeaways a season and a total of seven top-10 NFL rankings.

A former special teams/linebackers coach for the Broncos from 1987-92, Nolan is in his 23rd season coaching in the NFL and has instructed 14 players who have earned a total of 21 Pro Bowl selections. BRONCOS UPGRADE SECONDARY WITH TWO FORMER DOLPHINS

With the unrestricted free agent signings of cornerback André Goodman and safety Renaldo Hill, the Broncos improved their secondary with two players who started for Miami last year. The two played a key role in Miami's 11-5, AFC East-title season in 2008 after the club went 1-15 in 2007.

Goodman tied for sixth in the NFL with five interceptions in 2008 while also tying for seventh in the league with 19 pass breakups as a 16-game starter. He has played 87 games (55 starts) in his career with Miami (2006-08) and Detroit (2002-05).

Hill started 15-of-16 games played at safety for the Dolphins in 2008 and has appeared in 110 games (83 starts) for his career with Miami (2006-08), Oakland (2005) and Arizona (2001-04). He began his NFL career as a cornerback before switching to safety in 2006, and including postseason games, he has started 42 games at each position.

AYERS GETS BEHIND THE LINE

The Broncos' roster includes several new additions and returning players with proven success on special teams. Among them:

* - **S Vernon Fox:** Owns 48 career tackles on special teams and has posted at least 10 special teams stops in a year three times.

* - **ILB Mario Haggan:** Owns 61 career tackles on special teams and has posted at least 15 special teams stops in a year three times.

* - **OLB/DE Darrell Reid (UFA - Ind.):** Owns 45 career tackles on special teams and has posted at least 10 special teams stops in each of the last three years.

* - **CB Alphonso Smith (D2-37, Wake Forest):** Returned 24 punts for 182 (7.6 avg.) with one touchdown and 17 kickoffs for 352 (20.7 avg.) during his collegiate career at Wake Forest.

* - **S David Bruton (D4-114, Notre Dame):** Established himself as one of the best gunners in the country while appearing in 596 special teams plays for his collegiate career at Notre Dame.

PAXTON BRINGS EXPERIENCE AT LONG SNAPPER

Long snapper Lonie Paxton was one of the first unrestricted free agents signed by the Broncos in the offseason, joining the club after playing his first nine seasons with New England.

As a Patriot, Paxton played in 155 of a possible 161 games (regular season and postseason) and helped the club to three Super Bowl titles (XXXVI in 2001, XXXVIII in '03 and XXXIX in '04).

Below are some additional key notes on Paxton's career:

* - Helped the Patriots to four AFC Championship Game wins, six division titles and eight winning seasons.

* - Has not missed a game in the last five seasons, handling long-snapping duties in 80 consecutive regular-season games and 91 overall contests dating back to 2004.

* - Snapped for three Pro Bowl seasons by Patriots kickers (Adam Vinatieri in 2002 and '04; Stephen Gostkowski in '08).

* - Owns 17 career special teams tackles (14 reg. season, 3 playoffs).

* - Started for all four seasons along the offensive line and competed as a long snapper at Sacramento State University.



HEAD COACH JOSH McDANIELS

Josh McDaniels was named the 12th head coach in Denver Broncos history on Jan. 12, 2009. The 33-year-old joined the Broncos after spending the previous eight seasons (2001-08) with the New England Patriots, including the last three years (2006-08) as the club's offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach.

McDaniels was part of a New England franchise that won three Super Bowls, four AFC championships and six division titles while posting the NFL's best overall record (111-34 / .766) during his eight years with the club. The Patriots had seven 10-win seasons with him on staff, including the 2007 campaign when New England became the first team in NFL history to post a 16-0 regular-season record, as well as a league-high 14 play-off victories (14-3 postseason record).

Born on April 22, 1976, McDaniels is the sixth-youngest head coach in NFL history (32 years, 8 months) at the time of his hire and was the fifth youngest when he was named the Broncos' head coach. Raheem Morris, who was hired by Tampa Bay on Jan. 17, 2009, is four months younger than McDaniels and makes Denver's head coach the second-youngest active head coach in the league.

While he is the youngest head coach in the 50-year history of the Broncos, McDaniels' dynamic personality and organizational skills have already re-energized the entire franchise in just a short time in Denver. His previous experience came at the highest level while with the Patriots, whose standard of operation and success prepared him for the challenges of an NFL head coaching position.

Led by Head Coach Bill Belichick and personnel director Scott Pioli, New England evolved into one of the most successful organizations in the NFL over that eight-year stretch with McDaniels on staff. He was a part of that transition at both the coaching and personnel levels, beginning his career with the franchise as a personnel assistant/coaching assistant in 2001 before moving into a coaching capacity on a full-time basis in 2002.

After working as a coaching assistant for two years, McDaniels was named New England's quarterbacks coach in 2004. The club promoted him to offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach on Jan. 20, 2006.

During three years (2006-08) as offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach, McDaniels directed a New England offense that led the NFL in points per game (28.8) while ranking second in the league in yards per game (370.8). The Patriots also committed the third-fewest turnovers (63) and ranked fourth in the league in third-down success (44.4%) under McDaniels during that three-year period.

In his five seasons (2004-08) with the Patriots handling positional coaching responsibilities, McDaniels guided six different players to a total of nine Pro Bowl selections. Quarterback Tom Brady was named to the Pro Bowl three times (2004-05, '07) under McDaniels, including the 2007 campaign when he earned league MVP honors, and ranked fourth in the league in passing yards per game (249.4) during those five years.

Despite a season-ending injury to Brady in Week 1, New England's 2008 offense finished the year with an NFL-best 356 first downs and ranked fifth in the league in yards per game (365.4) under McDaniels. His coaching helped backup quarterback Matt Cassel, who became a starter for the first time since high school, post the eighth-most passing yards (3,693) in the league. McDaniels' passing offense in 2008 also featured wide receiver Wes Welker, who was named to the Pro Bowl for the first time in his career after finishing the year with the second-most catches (111) in the league.

During the 2007 season, McDaniels helped the Patriots set numerous league offensive records en route to becoming the first team in NFL history to win its first 18 games and advancing to Super Bowl XLII. New England's 589 points (36.8 ppg.) and 75 touchdowns were the most in league history for a season while its 6,580 yards (411.3 ypg.) ranked seventh in NFL annals for a single campaign.

Individually, five Patriots earned Pro Bowl honors under McDaniels' coaching in 2007—Brady, wide receiver Randy Moss and three offensive linemen (center Dan Koppen, tackle Matt Light and guard Logan Mankins).

Brady, the league MVP, set an NFL record for touchdown passes (50) in a season and registered the third-most passing yards (4,806) for a year in league history in 2007. Moss set a league record for touchdown catches (23) and totaled a franchise best for receiving yards (1,439). Welker's 112 catches tied for the league lead, set a New England record and marked the most receptions by a player in his first year with a new team in NFL history.

As quarterbacks coach with New England from 2004-05, McDaniels worked closely with Brady, helping him earn consecutive Pro Bowl honors. In that two-year period under McDaniels' instruction, Brady ranked second in the NFL in touchdown passes (54) and fourth in both passing yards (7,802) and completions (622). McDaniels earned the third Super Bowl ring of his career at the end of the 2004 campaign with New England's 24-21 win against Philadelphia in Super Bowl XXXIX.

He was named a coaching assistant by the Patriots in February 2002 with his responsibilities including film breakdown and scouting chart preparations for the defensive staff. McDaniels acquired additional responsibility in 2003 working with the defensive backs on a New England squad that had a 14-2 record and won Super Bowl XXXVIII with its 32-29 win against Carolina.

The Patriots' Super Bowl win against the Panthers was part of their NFL-record 21-game winning streak in which they went more than a calendar year without a loss (Oct. 5, 2003 - Oct. 24, 2004).

McDaniels joined the Patriots as a personnel assistant/coaching assistant in 2001, and helped the club to a win in Super Bowl XXXVI with its 20-17 upset win over St. Louis.

In 1999, McDaniels began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at Michigan State University. Working under Head Coach Nick Saban, he was part of a staff that helped the Spartans to a 10-2 record and a Citrus Bowl victory.

Initially recruited by John Carroll University (University Heights, Ohio) as a quarterback, McDaniels spent the majority of his collegiate playing career as a wide receiver from 1995-98 for the Blue Streaks. He graduated from the school in 1999 with a bachelor's degree in mathematics, joining Pro Football Hall of Fame Head Coach Don Shula (Class of 1951) as John Carroll alumni.

Born in Barberton, Ohio, McDaniels grew up in Northeast Ohio and was a quarterback and kicker at Canton McKinley Senior High School in Canton, Ohio. His father, Thom McDaniels, coached him at McKinley during his 16-year stint as its head coach from 1982-97.

Josh and his wife, Laura, have one son, Jack Thomas (5), and one daughter, Maddie (3).

McDANIELS BEGINS FIRST YEAR COACHING BRONCOS IN 2009

Josh McDaniels was named the 12th head coach in Denver Broncos history on Jan. 12, 2009. He joined Denver after spending the previous eight seasons with New England, including serving as the Patriots' offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach from 2006-08.
